God Values Children



here is an old adage that says, "Children should be seen but not heard." Perhaps it was used to control unruly and undisciplined children, but from a Biblical perspective such a rule is unfounded and unscriptural – in fact

it's devaluating. Over and over again Scripture applauds children who are both seen and heard. Children, and older young people, rightly instructed, contribute enormously to God's work in sharing His message of love and salvation with a sin-filled world.

Three of the gospel writers ascribe the value Jesus placed on children. "Jesus called a little child to Him, set him in the midst of them and said, ...unless you are converted and become as little children, you will by no means enter the kingdom of heaven. Therefore whoever humbles himself as this little child is the greatest... and whoever receives one little child like this in My name receives Me..." (Mt. 18:1-6). Evidently children and older young people have a way of getting the message across that sometimes adults, for various reasons cannot.

Take the child Samuel for example. Re-read 1 Samuel 3 and let the imagery catch your imagination. First of all, "the word of the Lord was rare in those days; there was no widespread revelation" (v.1). To a large degree, the injunction in Deuteronomy 6 was forgotten. Sin and injustice, crime and immorality apparently had benumbed the consciousness of even the religious leaders to the point God could not penetrate their hardened minds.

Secondly, although Samuel's age is not scripturally recorded, he evidently was still very young. Ellen White refers to him as the "child Samuel." Certainly he was young enough to not yet understand how God could manifest His presence. Scripture says, "Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, nor was the word of the Lord yet revealed to him." (v.7).

Thirdly, even as a child Samuel had the ability to respond to God's call. But it must be noted, that response came with coaching. Eli, recognizing that God must be calling Samuel, instructed him in how to make an appropriate response.

Finally, as Samuel responded, probably with great apprehension, the Lord gave him a huge message and a mission – a message that would strike fear into even the most courageous of men. Consider the stern words, "I will do something at which both ears of everyone who hears will tingle" (v.11), "I will judge his (Eli's) house forever for the iniquity which he knows, because of his sons...and he did not restrain them" (v.13), and again, "the iniquity of Eli's house shall not be atoned..." (v.14). Can a little boy – a child, bear up under such responsibility? Evidently - at least if that's God's instruction!

What does this tell us?

- 1. We must not devaluate children. They are as precious in the eyes of God as any other human being. Treat them with the utmost dignity, make friends with them, enter into their interests, and win their confidence.
- 2. Children may not fully comprehend all doctrinal matters as adults might, but that doesn't mean they can't grasp the basics of God's love for them and others.
- 3. Children can and do respond to the call of God. Granted, there is a huge benefit in godly coaching, and that's the responsibility of parents, church and school.
- 4. God has, can and may continue to ask children to conduct tasks for Him well beyond what we might think appropriate tasks that many of us, with our human pride and sophistication would cause us to shudder.

Children should be seen, and when God gives them a message they need to be heard. The question is, "are we listening?"



Music, an Inspiration of Faith



Donald W. Corkum (MDiv '70, DMin '10)



onald W. Corkum was born in Nova Scotia. After graduating from Atlantic Union College, South Lancaster, Mass., in 1965, he attended Andrews University to pursue theology through graduate studies. Corkum completed a Master of Divinity in 1970 and a Doctor of Ministry in 2010!

From 1966-1996, he served as a pastor, evangelist, and departmental director for two conferences in Canada. Throughout this 30-year span, he spent nine as the president of the Alberta Conference. When he went to the United States in 1996, Corkum served as the president of the Wisconsin Conference until retiring in April 2010.

Corkum has been actively involved in evangelism and has participated in mission trips to Peru and the Dominican Republic. He has also traveled several times to Israel to enrich the ministry there as well as helped to train pastors in the Ukraine following the evangelism explosion of the early 90s. Besides serving the church throughout these ministries, he has also led in fundraising for many capital projects and has written articles for Conference and Union communication magazines.

"Andrews University has greatly enriched my life both times I have pursued degrees there," says Corkum. "First, the training that was a springboard to my ministry with my MDiv, and the capstone to my ministry with a DMin near retirement. My life has been blessed by these two experiences."

We feel so blessed to have Don and Phyllis back "home" to Alberta to retire. They live in Calgary, and they have three children, Sheri, Rhonda, and Brian and four grandchildren.

- They will provide support through deeper partnerships between the home, school and the church.


What if all these dreams that the Lord has for us became a reality? The dreams the Lord has for us... that we would prosper.

Congratulations, Gertrude, your labour of love is outstanding! You truly are a modern Dorcas!


What is I M V O?

Conference Financial Report

The New Year is well under way and the Treasury Department is busy getting ready for the annual audit of the Alberta Conference books and the NAD policies. December is the month that tells us if we reached our budget goal for the year. We received over 22% of our tithe in the month of December. I am happy to say that we exceeded our 2010 budget by \$68,746. The people of Alberta contributed on a per capita basis \$1,256.22 in tithe last year for a total of almost \$13 million. I thank you for your faithfulness. By working together we can accomplish great things in Alberta.

The church faces many challenges, and we pray that the Lord will guide us in the direction He would want us to go. When we look at how we spend the Lord's money given into the storehouse, I would like to share a few numbers with you. We are part of a worldwide church and to support that worldwide work 25% of our tithe is given to parent organizations. Some of that is returned in grants and subsidies. Of the tithe dollars that we use in Alberta 55.5% is used for preaching, 27.5% for teaching, and 17% for serving the people of Alberta. Thank you for what you give to make this possible in Alberta.

Looking ahead, we want to keep our evangelism thrust to reach out to the searching. We have an aging campground, which we are slowly growing out of. We are working on a long-range plan to make your camp even better for you. The decline in the real estate market has kept us in our office building in spite of our water problems.

As we go forward into this year may we all be good stewards in what the Lord has entrusted to us. I hope that you will join me in praying for a revival and that it will begin with me and you. I believe that in these end times we need to draw closer to God than ever before. The signs within the church and in the world point to His coming. Let's work together to hasten His return.

Canadian University College Report

The Canadian University College (CUC) Board of Trustees met Friday and Sunday, February 4 and 6, 2011, and among other agenda items, heard reports of the University's progress. Following are excerpts and summaries from the President's Report to the Board:

- The primary reason Canadian University College exists is to prepare young men and women for active faith experience. Last year the dorm worship's program provided greater emphasis on small group worships, numbering as many as 36 groups meeting weekly.
- The Campus Ministries team offers student spiritual and service activity choices. Popular ministries include Hobbema, prison ministries, soup kitchens, and sunshine bands. Two new diverse student-led ministries includes a Sabbath afternoon AY (Adventist Youth) program, and the formation of a Southern gospel style choir known as Spontaneous Praise. The latter is well received both on campus and in non-Adventist church communities in Alberta.
- The Acronaires under the direction of new head coach, Toby Asante, has already presented a number of performances and workshops. They are currently planning a trip to Vancouver Island in March.
- The men's and women's soccer teams are experiencing success. The men's team has lost only two games, and the women's team has gone undefeated. To add enthusiasm, each goal the women's team scores raises money from donors for schools in Afghanistan. To date they have raised \$1295.
- The PE Complex continues to contribute to the physical well-being of students, faculty, staff, and members of the community. The gym floor and racquetball courts were refinished over Christmas break.
- The semester's WISE (Week in Spiritual Emphasis) concluded on January 29. WISE was completely student led, with 13 students identifying why they have chosen to be followers of Jesus Christ. Ten different praise groups led the singing.
- Under the direction of Student Missionary Leader, Eric Anderson, there is a significant increase in the number of students indicating a
 desire to serve as a student missionary. CUC is expanding the support and training it offers student missionaries before, during, and
 after their service.
- CUC opened the 2010 fall year with an enrollment of 493. Second semester projections were for a head count of 466. A drop in enrollment is typical between the two semesters. Reasons for the drop vary anywhere from course completions to academic restrictions, finances, family, and a host of other reasons.
- Regrettably Loma Linda University has discontinued its Canadian campus Marriage and Family Therapy program. On December 3, 2010, Dr. Richard Hart, President of Loma Linda University, released the following announcement:

Loma Linda University has recently reassessed its delivery of the Master of Science in Marriage and Family Therapy program on the Canadian University College campus and has determined that there are ongoing challenges with both costs and enrollment in the program. The administrations of the two institutions have discussed the problems of the high costs and small enrollment and mutually concluded with regret that it is prohibitive for Loma Linda University to continue to offer the Master of Science degree program at Canadian University College.

Loma Linda University has been pleased to provide the program in Canada for over two decades. Canadian University College has been pleased to host the program on its campus. The students who have graduated from the program have been of the highest quality.

Students currently enrolled shall be assisted in continuing their studies at Loma Linda University in California or through a "teach out" option via distance learning.

Haynal Inaugurated as New CUC President



Before friends, family, colleagues, and dignitaries, Dr. Mark Haynal was inaugurated as the 24th president of Canadian University College on February 4, 2011.

Haynal took over from previous CUC president, Andrea Luxton, whois now serving as provost at Andrews University.

He also owns the distinction of being the first child of a CUC graduate to later become president. In 1945, Haynal's mother, Helen Babienco, graduated from a one-year pre-nursing program at CUC.

"I am very glad that she can be here to witness this," Haynal said of his mother, who was in attendance for the ceremony.

Dr. Haynal's work as an educator started as an elementary school teacher. His post-secondary experience includes time at institutions in Washington, Indiana, Wisconsin, and Kansas.

"We've had two consecutive years of double-digit growth in enrollment," he said. CUC set a school record with 493 students enrolled in 2010.

Local politicians including Ponoka-Lacombe MLA Ray Prins, Wetaskiwin MP Blaine Calkins, and Lacombe Mayor Steve Christie spoke at Haynal's inauguration.

"From where I stand I see him as nothing but a positive influence for your entire organization," Christie said at the ceremony.

Haynal and his wife Kris have two daughters and one grandchild.
