On February 25 the Executive Committee for the Alberta Conference passed the budget for 2007. This budget is based on the giving patterns of 2006. We have endeavored to follow the Vision of the Conference which is "Every Member Faithful" as well as the Mission Statement "To Proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ by Serving, Teaching, and Preaching" in the creation of the budget.

By category, we are spending the portion of the tithe funds that the Alberta Conference receives in the following ways:

To Preach	\$ 5,466,391	57.7%
To Teach	\$ 2,349,703	24.7%
To Serve	\$ 1,655,838	18.6%

There are still many challenges that face the Alberta Conference in the months ahead. We have a committee that is studying the needs at Foothills Camp. As you well know there are areas like washrooms, lodging, and general upkeep of our facility that needs improvement so that we can use it to a greater capacity year around.

To better serve the churches in Alberta, the Executive Committee and a Visioning Committee have made recommendations that we have started to put in place in our budget for 2007. This will enable us to give better support to our churches and schools through manpower and resources.

I believe that as we go forward together to "Tell Alberta, Tell Canada" that exciting things are going to happen. May the Lord bless you as we partner together to finish the work here in Alberta. I'm anxious to go home, are you?







not yet found the joy of service!

As we look back at the reasons for sacrifice and preparation, perspiration and travel, camaraderie and progress, all who had a vital part in this project to date can symbolically see our God providing a 'cloud for shade during the day and a source of warmth by night.' To be honest, the Lord even 'parted some waters just when we needed a path.' Blessed be the Name of the Lord!

The greatest display of our 'blood, sweat and tears' turning into good and something that someone can benefit from, was when we saw the students arriving at our *Mount Olives Christian Academy* on the morning of September 4, 2006. Even though the students had helped the school staff and AMEN Ministries prepare for school opening a couple of days before school started, there was no greater joy

than seeing the cherubs arriving that first morning. And their uniforms! – What a beautiful outward sign of unity! They actually looked like an army.

Only 20% of our students have Adventist roots, but most of the students have Christian values. Many faiths are at work in the community. We have a tremendous opportunity to share the *Good News* of Christ's soon return while training these 'diamonds in the rough' to be productive citizens here and now.

We must tell you about our staff at *Mount Olives*. The principal, Fausto Cabanas, is a brother from *Valley of Peace* who drove many miles every morning for many years to the school

he taught at many miles away. To have this school is his own back yard is a dream come true. His wife, Magdelena, is also on the staff and a vital resource to the female population of the Valley and the school. Brother Eric from Pennsylvania, came to Belize as a student missionary, stayed, and helped us build a little, and then found a beautiful Belizian to share his life with. The real miracle of our staff is the arrival of Dale and Tammy Burns from Pierceland, Saskatchewan with their two young daughters, Kaylee and Leah and their dog *Spot*. The local people cannot believe a dog can be trained so well and behave so nicely. Truly, *Spot* is a missionary too.

I called Dale the other day to see how things were going, and he couldn't believe the kids could be so well behaved. He really believes we have done the right thing by building a school in this community. Over half of our kids would get no high school education if it were not for *Mount Olives*. Last

but not least, is our school secretary. She is a shy 16- year old, but handles the computer and her secretarial duties like a

pro. What a blessing to be part of this agency of redemption. God has given us abundant opportunities to live and share and go for Him. Let's not dismiss this occasion to "stand like the brave."

As we left to return home after the opening of *Mount Olives*, the weight of our next steps will be significant. The day-to-day operations of the school are costing us twice as much as we had planned. A new government law says that a teacher can only teach two core subjects. That is why we have four teachers for 31 students. If we can continue to operate this school we will be most blessed. We will not need any more teachers for next year's school program which will be another blessing. Plans are firmly in place for our 2007 building program – the addition of Grade 10 in September, another container will be leaving in March 2007 with more building materials and school supplies, and our volunteers are stepping up for another demonstration of unconditional loving.



A "Shopping Mall" at Mamawi Atosketan Native School

he air was full of excitement at Mamawi Atosketan Native School on December 19, 2006 as students examined the multitude of gifts that generous individuals had donated for the students to give to their family members for Christmas. In early December, when the staff pondered how to make Christmas extraordinary for these special children and their families, the thought came to have a "shopping mall." Planning was the easy part—staying on top of the countless number of phone calls for pickup was the difficult part, but all the donations were collected. There are no words to adequately express the appreciation of staff and students for the enormous generosity of Alberta church members and friends.

On December 18th all the goodies were brought to the gym, tables were set up and many of the Junior High students began the huge task of sorting through the gifts and organizing everything so that December 19th would go smoothly when all the other students joined them to do their "Christmas shopping." The staff thought that the students would need to be supervised, but as it turned out, the students happily engaged the staff as they looked through items saying, "Remember when?" or "Remember this?"

Donors did not just give inanimate objects. They gave smiles, squeals of delight, an abundance of energy, and an experience of bonding that could not be accomplished in any other way. This was an experience that did not involve "me, me, me." Not once was a child heard to say, "I wish that were mine," or "I'll get that for me." It was all about everyone else: kokums (grandmothers), mossums (grandfathers), mothers, fathers, aunties, uncles, brothers and sisters. The list could go on, but the point is, it was for everyone but the students themselves.

Those who donated gifts not only gave to the students but also to the staff. Around Christmas it is hard to keep up with everything going on, and the stresses of dealing with problems and issues that come to school with some Mamawi students are often overwhelming. But for these two days these children were just that, children! Too many, Mamawi students deal with too many adult issues on a day-to-day basis, and to see them being goofy, trying things on, playing with the toys and different items brought tears to the eyes of staff and smiles to their faces. They were priceless moments that, unfortunately, are too few and far between.

One of several parents called to say "Oh, you sent my kids home with so much stuff for Christmas!! I can hardly see my tree anymore. I can't believe what you did for us!" There are 11 people living in this house and needless to say, funds are low and Christmas was not looking so good.

Mission fields are often thought of as being far away in countries across the oceans and thousands of miles from our own back yard. The truth of the matter is, there is a mission field right here in Alberta. Many Mamawi students and their families were looking forward to a very dismal Christmas. Thanks to an avalanche of gifts from gracious contributors, they had a joyful Christmas instead.

Mamawi Atosketan Native School, located near the Hobbema Reserve in Central Alberta, is the only First Nations Adventist school in Canada. It is an outreach of the Alberta Conference Constituency to over 150 First Nations children and their families. Grade 7 Teacher Kelly Dreger put the school's mission in perspective in the school's fall 2006 newsletter. She wrote:

"We are part of the evangelistic team of the Seventh-day Adventist Church as we bring Jesus to the First Nations people in our own country. Your prayers and funds not only make this evangelistic mission possible, they also go toward Christian Education and the First Nations leaders of tomorrow. Thank you."



The next year the school had more students and moved into a small white schoolhouse in the middle of a stubble field, and Airlie was delegated as the school teacher. Allen went on to raise funds for the construction of the Adventist nursing home in Swift Current.

In 1967 the family moved to Alberta where Allen raised funds for the construction of the Sherwood Park Nursing Home (now the Sherwood Park Care Center) and later served as its administrator for 17 years. Airlie worked alongside Allen wherever she was needed – as cook, head of laundry, and finally as Allen's secretary/receptionist. The years at Sherwood Park Nursing Home and the early years of the Sherwood Park Church hold some of the best memories of Allen and Airlie's lives.

In 1986 Allen and Airlie realized a life-long dream when they accepted a call to serve the Lord as missionaries. Allen became the administrator of Karachi Adventist Hospital in Pakistan, Kanye Adventist Hospital in Botswana, and Mwami Adventist Hospital in Zambia. Allen was also the Director for ADRA Zambia where he developed and implemented the *Child Alive* program to provide pre-natal and infant care to rural mothers and babies. Airlie was as involved in missionary work as Allen – she kept the busy 'Fowler Hotel' in order, took care of secretarial work, taught elementary school and Bible and English classes, and supervised food distribution to refugees. Though they missed family and familiar surroundings, Allen and Airlie dedicated their lives to the Lord's work and thoroughly enjoyed their

missionary years. They made many wonderful friends and touched many lives. Allen's signature look of a black cowboy hat and cowboy boots became a legend in the areas where they worked.

In 1998, after 12 years overseas, Allen and Airlie returned to Canada. Allen became administrator of Sunnyside Adventist Care Centre in Saskatoon. Life had come "full circle" as they came back to Saskatchewan, where they began their careers with the church.

In 2002 the Fowlers retired and returned to their home in Sherwood Park. They praise God for His leading throughout their church ministry. The missionary spirit still burns in their hearts. They are actively involved with ADRA-ASI in the collection and distribution of used hospital equipment and supplies for the third world.

On February 3, Allen and Airlie, accompanied by their granddaughters, arrived in a white limousine at the Fairmont MacDonald Hotel in Edmonton where family and life-long friends surprised them with a lovely dinner and enjoyed an evening of "toasting and roasting" their 50 years together. "It was a very lovely evening," one of the newer church members remarked afterwards. "It is because of the women who were there and their friendship and caring that I have stayed with this church."


Following the practice that has become part of the fireside tea weekend tradition, Linda also spoke for divine service. Enlarging on her sermon title "Three Score and Ten–Then What?" she emphasized the importance of planning ahead for retirement for those who are younger and challenged the more senior listeners to maximize their retirement opportunities, and cautioned everyone to live to the fullest in the here and now.

Because working couples will suddenly find themselves in the house 24 / 7, she underscored their need to plan ahead so they individually will be easy to live with. She also gave these seven suggestions that will help ensure that there is "life after retirement:"

- Work on present relationships and develop healthy communication skills-including the ability to listen.
- 2. Cultivate friendships with those of your own age—then you'll have a peer group when you retire.
- 3. Cultivate friendships among younger people. They'll be there to stimulate your imagination and perhaps have children who need surrogate grandparents.

- 4. Develop hobbies. This is especially important for those who do physical work. Some hobbies may cost money, so plan ahead for that, too.
- 5. Find people who "need" you seniors, shut-ins, church members who become ill, and others who need company.
- 6. When you do retire, volunteer. Offer your skills, expertise, and energy to groups such as RCMP Victims Services, hospitals, schools, animal hospitals, library, or other boards, churches, or other organizations.
- 7. Never neglect physical exercise.

Linda recounted that as a teenager she told her mother, "When I'm 40 I want to die; I don't want to be a burden to anybody." Now, she and her husband Caesar, both retired teachers, live in Ponoka where they are "retreaded" volunteers for church and other community organizations.


