Interestingly enough, Gallup and Barna polls suggest that the churched, or those who call themselves evangelicals, differ very little from the non-churched or

the so called "pagan" world. In matters of honesty, covetousness, materialism, divorce, and physical and sexual abuse, the church goers (Churchianity) rank right up there with the non-churched. What is wrong?

Now there is a word with which we are all familiar and that is "Christianity" which defines those who profess belief in Jesus Christ and follow Him. Those who profess to be followers of someone have a relationship with the leader and they reflect that relationship in the way they live. (Just look at the Hare Krishnas—they even dress like their leader). Regrettably, too often the so called "churched" do not have a relationship with their leader, Jesus. That is where we can go wrong.

How is it with you? Which is best applicable to you? Churchianity or Christianity? Do you know your Leader?



MAMAWI ATOSKETAN NATIVE SCHOOL Praises God for a Special Gift

"There's no way they'll fit all of that in their van," the husband in the COSTCO parking lot whispered loudly to his wife.

"Do you want to bet?" she replied. "They've done this before; I can tell."

"You're on," he answered.

As the man's wife had astutely noted, we HAD done this before. And so, with our tires nearly scraping the wheel wells, we pulled away in the old van. Loaded with COSTCO groceries for the breakfast and lunch program at the Alberta Conference Mamawi Atosketan Native School (MANS), we left a disappointed husband to settle his losses.

The cost of the groceries to feed our 130 First Nations students is mainly supported by local Adventist churches who forward ADRA rebate grants to MANS. Until recently, these frequent food purchases were transported with the help of a volunteer couple and their aging van. As the principal of the school, I am truly thankful to them, as one van-full would have required four or five 110 km return trips in my own vehicle.



The keys to the new van were presented to Julie Bancarz, School Principal, by Pastor Romulo Daquila, Alberta Conference Vice President for Administration, on behalf of ADRA and the generous private donor. Ken Fox, Development Committee Chair and Pastor Ian Hartley, School Board Chair, looked on with appreciation



Calgary Southside Assists in a Philippine Crusade

Ephesians 4:11-13 says "And he Himself gave some to be apostles, some prophets, and some pastors and teachers, for the equipping of the saints for the work of ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ, till we all come to the unity of the faith and the knowledge of the Son of God, to a perfect man, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ."

When Mila Cabrera went home for a holiday in the Philippines last December she was touched and convicted to help spread the good news. She then presented the matter to the Southside

Medical Outreach - checked up, FBS screening, etc.

Church board where it was agreed and voted that Southside Church would financially assist a healthy lifestyle seminar and an evangelistic meeting. The matter was coordinated by Pastor Jueles Bermudez, the district Pastor of Namnama SDA Church in Cabatuan, Isabela, Philippines.

Ground preparations were made on February 2007. Church members enrolled VOP students, and these students were visited by the members of Namnama during the week and on Sabbath afternoon. In March the church tried to classify the VOP students as to class A, B and C interest. However, a very dismal result came out. There was not even 10% of the enrollees indicating an interest to hear God's message. The assessment was very frustrating, but God said, "Go and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit...I am with you always even to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:19, 20)

May 2007, the Pastor and the church members conducted a livelihood seminar where people were taught to make virgin coconut oil, gluten and soy milk. On the 27th of May the Crusade finally started and a big crowd was present during the lecture. However, because of frequent rain and always no electricity the lectures were then moved to 2:00pm to 5:00pm instead of 7:00-9:00pm. The time slot of the lectures did not work very well for many of the people because they are in the fields during the day but still the crusade had to go on. On May 31 the Cagayan Valley Sanitarium and Hospital conducted a medical outreach right there at the crusade venue. They offered free medical check up, blood typing, FBS screening, circumcision among children, and giving free medicine.


The crusade went on, home visitation, and serenading did not stop. Along the way while at the midst of the crusade, many signified their intentions for baptism and accepted Jesus as their personal Saviour. Thus on June 3, 2007 seventeen souls were baptized by Pastor Gideon Ronas followed by 29 other souls on June 9, 2007.

God is coming soon. It is our responsibility to share the good news to others. Let us use our talents and resources by God's grace in order that the work of God will be brought to a mighty finish.

Twenty-four of the twenty-eight students who participated in the Canada Youth Challenge program in Alberta for the months of June to August were present at the CYC appreciation ceremony held at the Calgary Garden Road Church August 11, 2007 at 5:30 p.m.

The students who came from different Adventist colleges and universities sold over \$150,000.00 worth of books and magazines in Edmonton and Calgary within a little over six weeks. Fourteen students stayed at the Edmonton Central Church. These students did not only sell books but, they also helped to distribute handbills inviting people to attend the evangelistic series in Edmonton. The other team of fourteen students used the Calgary Garden Road Church as their home base.

At the appreciation ceremony, students shared their testimonies of how God has blessed them in many marvelous ways such as: protection from possible dangers, opportunities were granted them to pray with different types of people and various kinds of needs, sold books in unlikely places, shared the love of Jesus to countless individuals, have invited several individuals to attend church


