Got 10 Minutes?

ave you got 10 minutes . . . just 10 minutes? Oh, it might be better if you could give more time, but even 10 minutes could make a real difference in the life of someone if you chose to spend the time for them.

Got 10 minutes? You could spend it praying for the five people to whom you most want to witness. That would mean praying for each of them for two minutes. God answers two-minute prayers!

Got 10 minutes? Sure you have. You could call one of the people on your prayer list. Say that you have only nine minutes left but that you would like to pray . . . right over the phone. You might even have a few of your 10 minutes left when you hang up.

Got 10 minutes? Why, of course you have. You could spend it writing a note to someone. The note could even include a personal testimony of your love for Jesus.

Got 10 minutes? Almost everyone does. You could spend them calling the Adventist Book Center (ABC) to order *Message* or *Signs of the Times* [or *El Centinela*] for someone on your prayer list. Adventists produce beautiful literature. We might as well use it often for ourselves and as gifts for others.

Got 10 minutes? Only 10? Well, you could call a friend in the hospital and wish her well, even have a short prayer with her. Sick people don't need long visits. Ten minutes will be plenty.

Got 10 minutes? Say something really positive to a young girl or boy. A kid won't be critical if you make it a short conversation. In fact, it will probably be more comfortable for both of you if you keep it short. But 10 minutes will be enough to make a huge impact on a life.

Got 10 minutes? Everyone does. Tell a coworker what you enjoyed most in the pastor's sermon last Sabbath. In fact, you could give a very short yet good summary in much less than 10 minutes. Even a non-Christian would not have to feel pressure if you simply give a short testimony of how the pastor's sermon touched you. The first time you try it, you could even change the subject quickly—several minutes short of the 10.

Got 10 minutes? Just 10—for totally new people? Give them a leaflet about Jesus. For just the amount of money that you get paid for working 10 minutes you can buy some from the ABC. You could, in fact, give away several pieces in 10 minutes.

Got 10 minutes? Before or after church? Invite the neighbors to attend next Sabbath. Many neighbors have never been invited to attend services at our church. Could you take 10 minutes to do it?

Got 10 minutes right now? Just bow your head and pray, "Dear God, I'm spending this one minute talking to You, but I'll spend the next nine listening to what You would like to tell me. What would You like to say to me if I would only be still? Are there any jobs You need me to do? OK, God, I'm Yours, and my time is Yours. I'm listening."

Alberta Pastor Featured by Amazing Facts

he Amazing Facts website recently featured an Alberta pastor. Here is what we found –

BIBLE WORKER EXPERIENCES SUCCESS USING AMAZING FACTS MATERIALS

Darrell Beaudoin is a pastor and Bible worker who serves four churches (Bonnyville, Boyle, Lac La Biche, Lloydminster) in northern Alberta. After trying several different Bible study methods, he now uses the Amazing Facts Study Guides and the A New Revelation videos in his evangelism work because he says they are the easiest to share and also the most appreciated.

Several people were baptized while he worked with the church in Taber, Alberta, and he believes the harvest is just beginning. According to Darrell, "The momentum is now gaining, and more baptisms are in the works."

"We are urging all Christians to join Pilgrims for Jesus to help to finish the work. We must let others know Jesus is




