Evangelistic Crusades

In March 2000 ten pastors along with their wives and some lay leaders from the Alberta Conference travelled to various places in the Philippine Islands to conduct evangelistic crusades on behalf The Quiet Hour. The following is a first-hand account from Irma Hartley: - Editor

or some, it was a mad rush to be ready to leave on the morning of March 14, 2000, our destination, the Philippines! Some had minimal amounts of luggage while others took medicine for the clinics, clothes for the orphanage and books to give away. We were on our way to conduct ten different crusades on some of the 700 islands that make up the Philippines. The Quiet Hour and the Alberta Conference were sending two people to each location, but any others were invited if they would pay their own way. Excellent materials were provided to use for the health, family and spiritual emphasis talks in the crusade. Pastor Bill and Gwen Spangler had gone over a month earlier to prepare the way for the other nine teams. The remaining nine teams consisted of: Pastor Andrew Chin and Chee-Kong Ho; Pastor Werner and Gerry Seidel; Pastor Ian and Irma Hartley, Kris Falk; Pastor Mike Lemon, Ben Lacanilao, Jennifer Aldous; Pastor Eustace Williams; Pastor Brian and Karen Hawes, Cheddie Williams, Bruce and Janice Schnurr; Pastor Kelvin and Carla Schultz; Pastor Justis St. Hilaire and Theodore Johnson; Pastor Roy and June Dubyna, Victoria Tataryn, Allen and Jemema Atrill; Pastor Paul Donnett and Tony

When we finally arrived in Manila, it was close to midnight. We were tired and waited in the dark parking lot for transportation details to be sorted out. Some spent the night at the conference office in Manila and others of us went to the Division guestrooms and the Adventist International Institute of Advanced Studies (AIIAS) in Silang, about an hour out of Manila. After a good rest each group left for a different location. For Ian and Irma Hartley and Kris Falk it was a one and a half hour flight which took us to Davao City on the southern island of Mindanao, the home of the famous durian fruit that is proclaimed to "taste like heaven and smell like hell". (editor agrees with this assessment)

The driving style in the Philippines is amazing. There are very few traffic lights, and we saw no STOP or YIELD signs anywhere, each driver was continuously conscious of what was happening behind, in front of, and next to him on either side and it seemed that whatever part of the road was free was available to whoever needed to use it at that time. The horn was used merely to indication your intention or presence.

The people in the Philippines were wonderfully friendly and hospitable and we enjoyed culinary vegetarian delights at each meal, expertly prepared for us by Smyrna, the lady who would live in our condo and take care of us. It was after several days into our stay there that we discovered that our hosts were extremely concerned for our safety, and a variety of precautions had been taken to ensure our safety. The Moslem extremist movement in Mindanao have been known to take foreigners hostage, with the intent of getting revenue to fund their move to make Mindanao a Moslem-ruled state. The meetings, we discovered, were attended each evening by three plain-clothes police for protection. Even our condo was extremely secure, every window and door was protected by burglar bars and the whole four-condo complex was enclosed by a high wall and gate accessible only by ringing the bell on the outside. However, we never felt afraid or insecure in our suburb of Bankal.

The crusade that we participated in was held in the Toril Church, about twenty minutes from our condo. The Toril Church seats about 500 people and the building is not completed and consists of the bare concrete walls with only openings where the windows will

Each evening saw about 100 children gathered for their songs and stories and Kris enjoyed teaching them new songs. Irma presented health and family features. Pastor Ian was in his element telling of God's goodness, wonderful love and forgiveness.

One of the highlights was the opportunity of visiting people in their homes, and every morning Pastor Cabaluna would take us to visit somewhere. There is a very interesting system followed in the Philippines in preparation for the crusades. Several weeks beforehand the Mission appoints and pays a small wage to laymen, men very well versed in their Bibles who go from door to door in the area assigned them, usually near their home, to study with interested people and invite them to the crusade. Transport was provided by the church so that people could easily get to the meetings. Public transport consists mainly of myriads of little tricycles, seating up to ten people, and hundreds of larger jeepnies, carrying up to thirty passengers, which are creatively re-designed jeeps left after the war by the US army, and now a flourishing industry.

Our visits took us to such interesting people and here are a few of the amazing visits we were able to make. An elderly gentlemen, a sharp shooter with the US army during the war with the Japanese, had been afflicted four years before our visit with a paralyzing stroke. He had time to reflect on the sad events of his earlier years and became increasingly depressed that God could never forgive him for the many people he had killed. But wonder of wonders! The tears of relief he experienced when he understood God's gracious forgiveness and love. Baptism could not come soon enough for him as he was afraid he might die before the end of the crusade. But he was spared to be carried into the ocean at the end of the crusade in his wheelchair and confirm his love and thankfulness to his God.

Annalisa was a young girl of sixteen, who had been possessed by the demons. The family had no Christian profession but a very special uncle was not afraid to share his convictions with them. Annalisa's father had a dream in which the devil told him he would show him where the Japanese had buried the gold in the creek before they retreated after the war, all this in exchange for one of his children. The father could not agree in his dream as he loved all his children very much. But the devil attacked one of his children anyway, and Annalisa started to develop seizures regularly, talking in a deep guttural male voice at these times. A large red "M" appeared on her arm which the devil said, when challenged by her uncle, meant "the terrible one" in the local dialect. A continuing terrible stomachache created fear that Annalisa would die and late one Friday night a message was sent for Pastor Cabaluna to come. When the messenger arrived and gave his request, Pastor Cabaluna told them "this sickness is not unto death" and he would come after his sermon the next day. That very night the large, strong supporting beam of their house snapped in two and the house came down. The family took refuge with the uncle who confronted the devil and on Sunday morning Annalisa vomited up a handful of little black stones, which the devil had made her eat, and she was made whole. What a delight to see a whole family committed to serve the God who was so powerful that He had healed Annalisa!

There was Julie who, after intently listening each night and believing, was convicted of the crime she had committed in aborting her baby because she was unmarried. God loves and cares and forgives and she grasped these wonderful concepts and with tears of joy and peace accepted God's gift of forgiveness.

Melody was a conspicuous attender because her face was radiant as she eagerly listened. Melody had been married at the age of twelve to an older man, who soon disposed of her by getting an annulment to their marriage. Without home or love, she finally found a nice young man to share her life with in her early twenties, but neither had the money to get married. Melody knew that what she was hearing in the meetings was what she wanted to accept without reservation and the terrible disappointment that she experience when told that until she was married to the father of her little baby girl, she could not be baptized. If her relationship to David was going to stand in the way of her relationship and commitment to Jesus she knew what she would do. But the church has a way of helping people in this predicament, and although Melody could not be baptized at this time, the church provided the money for her to get married and she would do all in her power to be ready to be baptized at the next baptism scheduled for the end of April.

The last Sabbath afternoon of the crusade saw everyone gathered on the beach for the baptism. One hundred thirty-one candidates, including young children, were lined up in four rows awaiting the four pastors to lead them into the ocean. When most people had left the beach to go back to the church for the next meeting, a group of nine more candidates arrived from Davao City. All in all, one hundred forty were baptized at the far north part of Davao City, under the gaze of the volcanic Mt. Apo.

We also had the serendipity of going on a few wonderful excursions with the Cabaluna family. We had a delightful swim in the clear blue sea on the small island of Samal off the coast of Davao City, and saw the endangered Filipino eagles in the sanctuary where they have a breeding program underway. Although Pastor and Beth Cabaluna will retire soon, they have responded to the needs of many orphan children and have recently adopted three young children. The youngest was two weeks old and seven weeks premature when they retrieved him from the hospital where his mother had left him. He is now one and one-half years old and the two older Cabaluna daughters help support the children, both financially and with motherly love. Thanks be to God for the blessings we received in our ministry in the Philippines!

DAN JACKSON, President, Manitoba-Saskatchewan Conference




LESLIE N. POLLARD, Vice President for Diversity, Loma Linda University

Ten Year Plan for "A Better World"

A Huge Success

Brian Leavitt, Vice-President at Canadian University College, and Eric Rajah, owner of Advanced Systems in Red Deer/Lacombe, along with 100 members of the College Heights SDA Church, formed an organization known as "A Better World" in 1990.

s a Christmas present to the world, a project would be funded in a third-world country to help alleviate human suffering, each year for a period of ten years.

Since its inception, "A Better World" has funded ten separate projects in various developing countries including Kenya, Nepal, Somalia, Sri Lanka, India, Thailand, the Philippines, and South Sudan. Both the Canadian government and international development agencies match funds raised locally by "A Better World".

The total value of projects completed so far has been in excess of \$550,000.

The first project undertaken by "A Better World" in 1990 involved the construction of a physiotherapy centre in Kendu Bay, Kenya. Upon completion of the centre, retired Canadian physiotherapist Ken Hill, was sent by "A Better World" to organize and equip the centre, and to train local staff. As he assessed the local needs, Hill made the dramatic discovery that hundreds of deformed and crippled children could be walking where now they were crawling or com-

pletely immobile. All that would be required was completion of a simple surgery costing \$75.00. He contacted "A Better World", and the organization's directors readily agreed to fund the surgery of 75 children operated on a trial basis. After one year, Hill reported that over 60% of the children operated on were now walking with the aid of crutches. Since these first successful surgeries, "A Better World" has funded a total of 200 operations on crippled children, and today 98% of these children are walking with the aid of crutches or completely on their own.

Last November, Rajah invited Gary Gant, non-SDA owner of Westridge Cabinets of Red Deer to join him and a small group of donors from Lacombe—Edith Fitch, retired teacher; Florence Guinet, retired nurse; and Ted Proud, local businessman. They toured, particularly, the physiotherapy centre in Kendu Bay. The tour participants were certainly not left unaffected by what they saw and experienced.

Says Gary Gant, "I have now seen the value of providing aid for projects such as these. The best thing about the project is that 100% of the donated money goes directly to the work. No administrative fees...no overhead...and the local people are involved in helping themselves." Gant is referring to projects that "A Better World" has implemented in which disabled people are provided with capital for raw materials to start their own trade, such as woodworking, basket weaving, or leather product manufacturing. Such

projects enable them to become productive members of society.

A recent non-SDA business partner to join the effort is Gord Bontje of Laebon Homes in Red Deer. After hearing Gant's report of this trip, Bontje offered a significant amount of money to continue the work in Kenya.

Since the start of the project, the Kenyan government has provided fifteen physiotherapists for the Kendu Bay region, and CIDA (Canadian International Development Agency) has provided funding in the amount of \$300,000. CIDA has also offered "A Better World" a

\$75,000 grant to expand the project next year.

As co-founder Eric Rajah says, "The project has gone beyond my imagination. A little bit of help from committed people has given hope to hundreds of people in need, and has made the world a better place for them to live."
