Alberta Seeks Lay Missionaries to Work in Unentered Territories

he Alberta Conference recently voted a plan called GMA (Global Missionaries to Alberta) to reach the unentered areas of Alberta with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The GMA plan calls for placing lay missionary workers in areas of the province with no significant Adventist presence, placing lay pastors in a church that is very small or with declining membership, or placing youth (called Young Pioneers) on the campus of a public university to conduct ministry. Continuing education support, a small stipend, and mileage expense remuneration will be provided for successful GMA applicants.

The following are some types of persons to be considered for GMA: a) Retirees, b) Those with income from other sources and need not depend on a regular salary, c) Those who have vocations or occupations that provide part time work and income, and d) College/academy students who qualify to work as Young Pioneers (administered through the youth departments of the NAD and Alberta Conference).

he last few weeks have been, for me, an incredible time of faith building. It all began with an increasing number of Alberta phone calls from people who were calling to "just get acquainted." As the calls continued to come I began to sense that perhaps there was a serious interest in my coming to Alberta. And so I began to pray very earnestly that God would lead the committee in the selection process. I wasn't sure if I was interested in coming, but I knew that I wanted God to lead in the selection because we are living so close to the end of time that I realized that the next president of the Alberta Conference could possibly be its last.

In view of my thoughts and prayers, I received Elder Parchment's telephone call, inviting me to serve as Alberta's president, with a certain amount of awe. Could it be that God was actually speaking to me through the committee and its decision? I began to pray more earnestly that, if God indeed wanted me to assume this leadership role in Alberta, He would provide me with a very tangible assurance that He would be with me and direct me in those responsibilities. But our time of prayer is not over; it has only just begun. For the only success that we can have as God's people is the success that will come from seeking His continued guidance and direction. I invite and urge you to continue—with the same degree of interest and intensity—to pray for God to show His church how to reflect His character and enlarge His kingdom. Pray that God will reveal to every church member the special role that He has equipped them to fill in the finishing of His work. And if I may be so bold as to ask it, will you daily pray that God will direct your very human president to be able to lead according to His plan? I covet and need your prayers. And I have faith to believe that as we pray together as a people for His direction, we will soon see His work finished and our Saviour returning.

Bridgeland Dedicates Phase One of Building Project

n December 9, 1995, officials from the Alberta Conference and the City of Calgary joined with members of the Bridgeland SDA Church to officially open the new Multi-purpose Centre—a structure which represents the completion of Phase One of the project. Phase Two constitutes the sanctuary. For the Bridgeland congregation it was our appropriate time to offer praise and thanksgiving for the fulfillment of a long awaited vision. Still for others it was a sweet homecoming.

Elder Don Corkum, former President of the Alberta Conference, reiterated the fact that God's people need to have realistic visions in order to evangelize the world. Alderman Bob Hawkesworth, who represented the City of Calgary, praised the congregation for their contribution to the community. Elder Don King, Secretary of the Alberta Conference, offered the prayer of consecration for the new building which includes a gymnasium (seats over 500 for worship services), several classrooms, kitchen, and pastor's office. Elder King also welcomed the congregation to their community home.

The Bridgeland church has been an important part of the Bridgeland community for many decades. In 1963 a small group of German immigrants built and worshipped in the first SDA church there.

In the 1970's and early 80's the congregation grew rapidly as Caribbean, Oriental and African immigrants were welcomed into the membership. Overcrowding soon

became a problem and in 1982 a decision was made to divide the congregation thus forming two separate churches. One group left and made their new home in the Forest

Heights community creating the Forest Heights SDA church.

In 1989, the responsibility of pastoring the Forest Heights church was given to Pastor John Adams. Soon after taking office he brought his congregation back to their former home in Bridgeland to be reunited once again.

The problem of overcrowding soon became a hot topic at church board meetings and it became apparent that a solution was urgently needed. The church needed a bigger home.

In 1990, the original Bridgeland church building was sold and the congregation sought rented facilities for Sabbath worship. In 1992 a parcel of land was purchased in the Bridgeland community.

Under the leadership of Pastor John Adams, a fund raising committee was selected that immediately went to work. Projects for fund raising included activities that ranged from walkathons to garage sales and everything in-between. Whenever the flames of enthusiasm flickered or dimmed, Pastor Adams was always there with words of encouragement. And so it went on for two years.



After a series of meetings with city officials, community groups, architects, builders, conference committees etc., construction on the new church centre facilities began in the spring of 1994.

As plans were being made to hire professional building contractors for different phases of the construction work, the building committee discovered that there were some skilled trades people like carpenters, electricians and painters within the congregation.

Some were hired on a full-time basis while others volunteered their time. For example, Willie Higgins, a long-time member of the church, took on the responsibility of building contractor and supervisor. Our head elder, Lloyd Ramson, took charge of all the electrical responsibility.

Almost everyone associated with the project donated time or money or both. It was really a blessing to see the fulfillment of this dream.

Truly, great things can be accomplished when God's people unite and work together. The Bridgeland church is a living testimony to such an effort.

'm a behind-the-scenes person," says Inza Carls, a shy little lady from Drumheller, Alberta as she holds a recent copy of *Signs* magazine in her hands.

"I'm not an up front person at all. But the Lord has given me a job and an income. This is my way of saying thanks and working for him."

What is Inza talking about? She's talking about the hundreds of names on her list to whom she personally sponsored *Signs* subscriptions during the past 21 years. Family members, friends, neighbors, and hospital patients—they all have been blessed by *Signs*. There have been a few subscriptions that have been sent back but most have been appreciated. "Even if

they're thrown in the garbage," she says, "God will look after these magazines. It's His work."

I asked Inza what motivated her to get involved for so many years. She said: "I've

always wanted to do something for the Lord but wasn't sure what to do. I always liked Signs. It seemed so down to earth. Besides, it spoke the truth. So I decided to get



involved in signing up people for the magazine. I've never really enjoyed knocking on doors. But I feel comfortable doing this ministry. This is my shy cowardly way of working for Him. This is my little niche."

"I've sown the seed," says Inza, "and the Holy Spirit will water. I claim the promise that if you cast your bread upon the water, it will not come back void. Even if one soul

> is saved, it's worth it. You can't put a price on a person's life." And indeed, one person on her list (that she knows of) has been baptized.




